

# 16-19 Bursary Fund Guidance 2022/23 Who can apply?

The 16-19 Bursary Fund is to support learners in full time further education by providing a contribution towards the cost of attending the college such as travel, meals, equipment and other course related costs. Learners will be eligible for bursary support if they meet one of the criteria listed in the table below.

The 16-19 Bursary Fund is available to learners aged 16-18 (under 19 on 31<sup>st</sup> August 2022) that have an annual household income of less than £30,000. Learners aged 19+ can apply for the Tier 1 or Tier 2 categories if they either have an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP) or they are continuing on a study programme which began when aged 16-18.

The value of the award will vary depending on criteria including household income, personal circumstances and college course. Learners must maintain a minimum of 80% attendance. All awards will have a total capped amount.

For other learners aged 19+ on 31st August 2022, please refer to the 19+ Learner Support Fund Guidance.

#### **Travel costs**

- ➤ Tier 1 Free travel (a maximum cap will apply).
- ➤ Tier 2 Subsidised travel.
- Non bursary learners discounts available on local bus routes (subject to area).

### **Course related costs**

- Essential course costs can include equipment, uniform, text books, DBS check.
- > Course costs vary depending on the course and some courses have no essential costs.
- > Bursary does not cover non-essential course costs.

## **Free School Meals**

Awards for meals will be credited to the student ID card on a weekly basis to the value of £3.50 per day in attendance.

## Monthly maintenance award

- ➤ This award is only available to learners that meet the criteria for Vulnerable Bursary.
- > Payments are transferred directly into the learner's bank account each month.
